

Children's Book Illustration Workshop (Guns Are Uncool!)

Teachers: David Tillinghast, LaShawn Moore and Special Guest Ariel Lee

April 6, 1-3pm at the Central Library Branch 285 E. Walnut St, Pasadena 91101

Create your own children's book illustrations with Ariel Lee, author/Illustrator of Mark & the Jelly Bean Monster. Ariel's book follows Mark as he seeks to protect his amazing Jelly Bean collection from the forest dwelling Yeti, who turns out to be a new friend after his own heart, with a pretty cool collection of Jelly Bean's of his own! Her playful story and beautiful illustrations were created to encourage children to consider other solutions to conflict beyond the use of guns, and her book will be sure to capture the hearts of every child who attends. There will be a reading of the story, followed by a discussion with Los Angelesbased elementary teacher LaShawn Moore.

A creative workshop will follow the reading and discussion, where participants can create their own drawings or paintings, expanding on Ariel's story of Mark, the Yeti, and the amazing Jelly Bean collection! As if that weren't enough fun, the artist/author herself will be on hand to demonstrate how she created the drawings and paintings for the book. We invite all children between the ages of five and eight to hear a wonderful new children's book, create some art in an exciting workshop atmosphere, and consider a world where guns are not used to solve our problems!

The Very Cool Poster Workshop
